The 16th annual teem match between Northern Golifornia and Southern Golifornia was, to players and spectators alike, the most exciting in the history of the event. The two teams were evenly matched all the way from the first board to the 57th, and the wins and losses were not only wearly discussed throughout the lineap but also cause alloust in rotation during the Gay.

The South wasoff to a two-point lead when the first two games were scored. Fromthen on the match was like a huge relay race with 57 runners. The North could scarcely score a point, reducing the lead to one game, before the South would chalk up another and move out in front again by the same margin. The difference between the two teams was 2 points throughout the day, except for brief instances when it was temporarily 1 or 3, until the North finelly caught up with the South with only six games to go. At that point the suspense, which had been mounting in intensity for hours, was terrific. First the North, then the South took the lead. Adding to the uncertainty was the fact that the game on Board #1 had been adjourned until Monday, with a Queen and Pawns ending in which anything might happen. At length the situation came down to depend upon the game on Board #39, where Ted Dana of Palo Alto suddenly found himself the most important man on the North team, With a rook ending and even Pawns, Ted was instructed to play for a draw. At six o'clock, after seven hours' play,

"OUT OF THE PAST, IN CALIFORNIA CHESS" By Harry Borochow - Los Angeles

In 1930, following the first round of the California State Championship, hold at the Mochanics' Institute Chess Club in San Francisco, I passed by a book store, and noticed "My System" by Aron Mimrorich in the window. In the March 1948 issue of the British periodical CHESS, the wellknown Problem-Expert Mr. C.S. Kipping presents, under the above title, an extremely interesting series of Two-Move problems of his own composition designed to illustrate how Chess-Players' objections to complex, un-natural positions and the usual overwhelming White force may be eliminated in problems.

Mr. Kipping's idea is to use only two White pieces in addition to the King, and to show two mates by each of the two pieces. All possible two-piece combinations are used by the composer, and

students are urged to study the following positions and note how neatly Mr. Kipping has overcome many difficulties.

The composer does not claim originality of the settings. Six of the original twenty problems are shown below:

SOME CHESSMASTERS I'VE KNOWN (By E. J. Clarke, M.I.C.C.) Dean of Pacific Coast Chess

DB. EMANUEL LASKER

Our series title, in the case of this great chessmaster and philosopher, must be modified. Instead of "known." let us substitute "met." It is doubtful if anyone could truthfully claim to have known Emanuel Lasker. I recently reread F. Reinfeld's Introduction to the "Manual of Chess." It is mainly concerned with Dr. Lasker as a chess genius -- along with much talk of schools, styles, the big city noisily welcomed the New systems, etc .-- all no doubt most profound and recondite: but no more accounting for the phenomenon of a Lasker than an analysis of Mozart's music ex-

plains his genius.

I first met Dr. Lasker about the time of the Cambridge Springs Tournament of 1904. A few months after the master started "Lasker's Chess Magazine" I joined the staff as News Editor. While the remun eration was modest yet to be associated with the world's champion chess player, what an honor! Besides Dr. Lasker, who wrote editorials and annoted a few games, the staff consisted of a superannuated printer, who set up the many diagrams, and an English analyst named Bauman. The following New Year's Eve found the staff as guests of the master at Martin's Restaurant on Fulton Street. While even 45 years ago the neighborheod had become declasse, yet at that time Martin's was a famous name, as well known as Delmonico's. During the many-course dinner, I do not recall that chess was mentioned. Dr. Lasker. helding a glass of burgundy or cabernet to the light quoted the Latin wag: "In vino veritas," and invited discussion as to its interpretation. It may be of interest, by way of present skyhigh restaurant prices, to mention that the total cest of a special holiday dinner for four, including extra wine, and tip. was but \$10. Oh. for the good old days! After dinner, the printer having retired. Dr. Lasker and the remaining "staff" made a tour of the many East Side coffee-house chess spots and the larger Cosmopolitan Chess Club, haunt of Jaffe and other well-known experts.

I shall never forget the thrill as the champion entered the room, the players stopping their games, and the whispered exclamations: "Dr. Lasker!" Whersupon the master nodded greetings and exchanged a few words with acquaintances. Finally midnight (1904-05) found the trio in an obscure uptown billiard room, playing a three-handed game as

In 1907 I had the honor to act as Dr. Lasker's second in the opening game of his match with my very close friend, Frank J. Marshall, at the Cort Theatre, Brooklyn, in the presence of the "Who's Who of Eastern chess. I met the doctor on his last visit to the M.I.C.C. about 1910. My final meeting was in 1924 after his splendid win of the Now York Tournament. Chess honors never

affected him and he was not too busy to talk over the old days.

It may seem paradoxical to state that, while Dr. Lasker achieved worldwide fame and some financial success thru chess, his mind and heart were elsewhere. At one time I possessed an autographed copy of "Struggle"--his philosophy of life. Unfortunately, only a few will lend an ear and still fewer purchase. So "Struggle" was practically stillborn, However, Charles Mugent, a problem composer and centributor to Lasker's Chess Magazine, endeavored to apply the principles of "Struggle" to weaken the resistance of a fair damozel, who seemed immune to the routine technique in Amor's domain!

I would like to pay tribute to Dr. Lasker's character. To put years of thought and reflection into a book and additional months! effort wrestling with problems of exposition of new ideas, then to meet with indifference and apathy -- that is a test, and Dr. Lasker. while expressing disappointment, neverthe less maintained his customary cheerfulness ... Just before his death in 1943, he had given the world his though tin "The Community of the Future." which. sad to relate. met with about the same

indifference as his other non-chess books.
