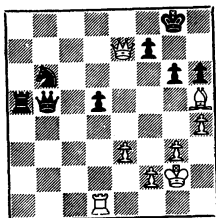


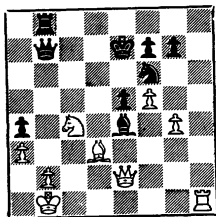

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NORTH AGAIN CHAMPIONS, 29-19

The North gained a decisive margin on its "middle" boards, winning 12 out of 13 from Board 31 to Board 43 alone, and thus regained the team championship of the state at the annual Memorial Day event in Fresno.

The return to Fresno after one year at San Luis Obispo was dictated by lack of a suitable non-holiday weekend and absence of opinion to the contrary.

STATISTICAL REPORT by E. C. Jonas

The 1964 Northern California vs. Southern California team match was the 31st in a series started in 1926. This year's match was 48 boards. Of the total of 48 games played, 20 were won by White, 18 by Black, and 10 were drawn.

The South has won 8 times, the North now 20 times, and there have been 3 ties. A total of 1,270 games have been played during this period (not counting a 20-board match between the "second" teams in 1947, won by the North 10½-9½). Total score: 694½-575½.

Over the years, the North has used a total of 298 players, while the South has used 425. There have been 39 players who have played at various times for both North and South. Previous results:

MINUTES OF THE 30TH ANNUAL CSCF MEETING

Place: Hotel Californian, Fresno, California

Time: May 30, 1964 @ 9:45 P. M.

President Isaac Kashdan called the meeting to order.

In the absence of Secretary Spencer Van Gelder the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting was dispensed with.

Allan Troy, Chairman of the Sub-committee of the Constitutional Amendment Committee, reported that since the last annual meeting he had met several times with Isaac Kashdan and Irving Rivise but no complete, clear-cut decisions had been forthcoming. Mr. Kashdan stated that it had seemed unnecessary to notify the North because the Sub-committee had agreed that the CSCF should be continued as a principle.

The Treasurer's Report was accepted unanimously.

Gordon Barrett gave a report on tournaments in the South during the past year and the 1963 State Open & Closed Championships. He stated that there were 36 tournneys with over 1200 entries. The second Piatigorsky Cup is expected to be held in 1965.

H. D. Rader made an additional report on tournaments in the South, covering the details of the Experts Candidates Tourney, the Team Matches involving 38 6-man teams in 4 divisions, and the Morphy Day Celebration.

Guthrie McClain gave a report on tournaments in the North during the past year. He stated that Mechanics Institute has been reorganized - club is open daily - now is run by a committee - is of primary influence in the North. Carroll Capps continued the report by giving a most interesting account of the details of the Fischer simultaneous, the giant 10 sec tourney and the Arthur Stamer Memorial Tournament.

Isaac Kashdan stated that it appeared time for a coordinated calendar of N/S chess events.

Under the heading of new ideas to promote bigger and better chess tournaments, H. D. Rader presented a sound scheme involving a more equitable and attractive distribution of the prize money based on allocation of entry fees. There will be winners not only for Masters, but for Experts & Classes A, B, C & D, as well, if his idea is used. (Similar ideas have been used with increasing success elsewhere, during the past two years.) Favorable comments were heard from Dr. Janushkowsky, A. Troy, Blackstone, G. Rasmussen & K. Forrest. H. Gross moved, and it was seconded, that Mr. Rader's idea be submitted to the Tournament Committee for further study.

Under new business - a motion was made to hold a tournament instead of the usual match at the 1965 meeting on the Memorial Day weekend - not carried. A motion was made to provide that the 1964 N/S Match be USCF rated, and all future N/S Matches (if feasible) - carried.

MINUTES OF 30TH ANNUAL CSCF BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

Place: Hotel Californian, Fresno, California

Time: May 30, 1964 @ 11:30 P. M.

Presiding Chairman Guthrie McClain of the North took the role call; Directors Barrett, Hoke, McClain, Janushkowsky, Rasmussen, Hoppe and Rivise were present, constituting a quorum.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting of the Board was dispensed with in the absence of Secretary Spencer Van Gelder.

Gordon Barrett of the South was unanimously voted Chairman of the Board for the coming year.

It was decided to suspend further action on the proposed constitutional amendment as there seemed to be no advantage possible because of better coordination between North and South affairs.

In order to increase membership in the CSCF it was decided that all future participation in State tourneys will require CSCF membership.

In the future, the California State Closed Chess Champion (who must be a USCF rated Master) will automatically be seeded into the U. S. Championship.

The appointment of Directors to the USCF for the coming year hinges on those CSCF members who may be planning to attend the USCF tourney in Boston during August, 1964.

Director Barrett outlined plans for the annual College Tourney to be held at California State College at Los Angeles (in the City Terrace area).

SACRAMENTO INTERNATIONAL HANDICAP

The Sacramento International Handicap, played from March 11 through May 27 at the Wednesday evening meetings of the Capital City Chess Club, incorporated three unusual ideas in one very unique event. Two of these ideas are evident from the title: the 53 entrants contributed \$106 to USCF's International Fund, and one set of prizes was awarded under the Handicap Scoring System (as described in CHESS LIFE, May 1962). Prizes were also given on the more regular basis of game points scored.

The third unusual idea was to schedule all games in advance by using a modified version of the New Haven Pairing System. With 24 (more than half) of the players previously unrated, some rather strange results occurred. The highest rated player in the tournament lost his first two games, but still acted as a "spoiler" in the remaining four rounds by continuing to play top-rated contestants. Meantime, several of the unrated players turned out to be quite strong--but they never did have to play a top-rated opponent. This rather thwarted the Handicap System, which is based on the premise that a winning low or unrated player gets a high Handicap Score by virtue of playing ever farther over his starting position. It also made hash of game point scores, as the top-rated contestants knocked each other out of the running while a previously unrated player went through with six straight victories.

Actually, these topsy-turvy aspects added considerable interest to the tournament and a good time was had by all.

USCF President Ed Edmondson directed the event, also scored 5-1 and finished second on Handicap Score, fourth on game point score. 24 USCF memberships were submitted, bringing the Prexy's total since last August's U. S. Open to 99. If everyone on the USCF's Board of Directors did this well, more than 20,000 memberships would have been submitted in a nine-month period!

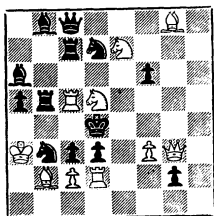
OBITUARIES

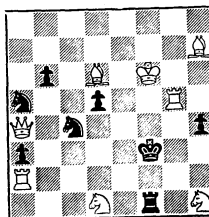
