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#### JERRY HANKEN WINS 1964 CALIFORNIA OPEN

Jerome Hanken of Los Angeles upset the odds-makers at Fresno on the Labor Day week end and trounced eight masters and 24 experts, not to mention 68 other chess players, as he won the California Open  $6\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ . He thereby won the first prize of \$158, took home the trophy, and qualified for the finals of the State Championship.

Hanken has been a formidable opponent since he came to California from the New York area several years ago, but this is by far his big rest victory. A selection of his games appears in this issue.

The field of 91 players in the California Open included all sorts of champions: Tibor Weinberger 6-1, Walt Cunningham 6-1, Ray Martin  $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ , Irving Rivise  $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ ; ten players tied with 5-2 scores including former champion Zoltan Kovacs and such redoubtable players as Jose Mondragon and Dr. F. Gamboa of Mexico, Charles Henin, Arthur Spiller and Roy Hoppe; former champion Sven Almgren scored  $4\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ , and there were many others.

The tournament was held at the Hacienda Motel and was directed by Gordon S. Barrett.

#### JERRY HANKEN CALIFORNIA OPEN CHAMPION

Jerry Hanken won the 1964 California Open by the fine score of  $6\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ , topping a strong field of 91 players, including 8 masters and 25 experts. Hanken played a strong schedule, defeating Zoltan Kovacs, Charles Henin and Jose Mondragon (of Tijuana). His only draw was against Tibor Weinberger in the fifth round.

Tibor Weinberger and Walt Cunningham tied for second, 6-1. Ray Martin and Irving Rivise tied for fourth,  $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ , and there were ten players with 5-2 scores. The prizes were awarded on a new system:

#### THE NEW PRIZE SETUP EXPLAINED

Instead of awarding class prizes like Expert, A, B, C, etc., prizes are given in categories of an Open Fund. To illustrate: The conventional prize for Experts, under the old system given to the highest-finishing expert, can now be won by the highest-finishing player UNDER 2200 (in other words, all except masters) and in the case of the under-2100 category, the highest-finishing player except masters and top-half experts. Similarly, the old system's Class A prize can now be won by the highest-finishing player under 2000.

Of course, every player, including an unrated player, is eligible for the Open Fund prizes (an unrated player is eligible for all prizes in all categories - he's under everything). Only one prize per player may be given, and it must be the largest sum possible for him to win. This is an important rule, because a player may easily be eligible for several prizes.

A player, through his entry fee, contributes a certain amount to his category's prizes, half as much to the next higher category, half as much again to all closest higher categories, and the remainder goes into the Open Fund. For instance a 1725 player, contributing \$8 to the total prize fund, breaks it down as follows: \$2 to Under 1800, \$1 to Under 1900, 50¢ to Under 2000, 50¢ to 2100, 50¢ to Under 2200, and the balance of \$3.50 to the Open Fund.

Advantages of the system: 1. Greater number of prizes. 2. By far the majority of players are eligible for more prizes than before. 3. An unrated dark horse no longer deprives a Class C player from his prize (the old system often lumped Class C and unrated players) because the dark horse will most likely win a larger prize. 4. A player, through his entry fee, contributes only to those categories he is eligible to win. 5. The usual top prizes are not reduced. The Open Fund is quite compatible with any old top prize setup. 6. As players cannot be sure which prize they will win, the new system creates excitement.

Disadvantages are: 1. It is pretty hard to explain to the players.

2. In general, the tournament must be completely over before prizes can be determined, as one outstanding game at top level may affect all the prizes.

3. It may take a lot of extra time for the T.D. to figure all prizes.

4. Players with the same score may win different amounts (see the prizes, page 18).

#### SAN QUENTIN WINS BAY AREA INDUSTRIAL LEAGUE TEAM TITLE

The team from San Quentin Prison won the 1963-64 Championship of the Bay Area Industrial League by the narrowest of margins over the PG&E Bishops. The winning margin was rolled up in point scores, as San Quentin lost two matches to the Bishops'  $1\frac{1}{2}$ . The point scores include two points for a match win between 6-man teams, so San Quentin actually outscored the runner-up team by  $1\frac{1}{2}$  points, in spite of losing the match with the Bishops.

The league celebrated its tenth year at a banquet held at Spenger's Restaurant in Berkeley in November. At the meeting, league president Bob Nielsen of Shell Development Company awarded individual prizes and announced that George Koltanowski would be tournament director for the 1964-65 season. (Kolty had been one of the founding fathers of the Industrial League, and he remarked upon the progress made during the last ten years.)

Winners of individual prizes were assistant tournament director Harry Kor of the San Quentin Morphys, who was high point man with 10 points from 12 games, and Horst Bullwinkel ( $9\frac{1}{2}$ -11), Vartan Bedjanian ( $8\frac{1}{2}$ -10) and L. Solbeau ( $9\frac{1}{2}$ -12) --all from the same team, the PG&E Bishops--who won the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd scoring prizes.

#### NORMAN WOOD WINS SAN FRANCISCO CITY CHAMPIONSHIP

Norman Wood came down from Santa Rosa in August to wrest the City Championship away from the natives, and did so without it being necessary to play the last round. Wood won five straight games, at which time his nearest opponent had only  $3\frac{1}{2}$  points. It being a long trip that evening to Santa Rosa, Wood took the trophy and the first prize of \$100 and went home.

The tournament was the first of three qualifying tournaments for the State Championship finals, to be held in San Francisco during the Thanksgiving week end, November 26-29. It was also a renewal of the San Francisco City Championship for the Peter V. Prokoodin perpetual trophy, a title which has been in abeyance for several years but which was revived as a part of the current activities program at the Mechanics' Institute.

Along the road to victory, Wood seemed to have a charmed life. An underdog in the ratings and an "unknown" in San Francisco, Norman won good games from Gross, Capps, Radaikin and Coffino while everyone else was being bombed from all sides. Consequently, Wood did not meet such strong players as Wilcox, Hoppe, Thornally and Kane - because they did not have nearly enough points!

#### GAME OF THE MONTH

This is the first of a selection of games by the new California Open Champion, taken from the event. The games are interesting in themselves, but also give a good picture of J.B. Hanken's style. It may come as a surprise to many California players to learn that Hanken's record against the top masters who have played in California is 21 wins, 18 losses, and 12 draws. This includes Evans, Benko, Weinberger, Kovacs, Addison, Rivise, Cunningham, Simon, Pilnick, Henin, A. Sandrin, Lazos, Jacobs, Martin, and Mondragon, an impressive list.

As the games will show, Hanken has a dangerous counter-punch which can win games without impressing the spectator. In the Game of the Month, however, he puts on a textbook demonstration of the minority attack. He shows that the QKtP can typically throw himself on the Black Pawn phalanx without immediate support, because the backwardness of Black's Queenside makes it permanently weak. Note that 23... Kt-Q7 is answered by R-Kt4.

#### ARTHUR B. STAMER

A.B. Stamer, one of the last of the old-timers of the Mechanics' Institute Chess Club, died in San Francisco in early 1964 after a short illness. Arthur was a veteran of the famous team which played telegraphic chess in the 1920s (and started the North vs. South over-the-board team matches by meeting Los Angeles at Atascadero in 1926), and he was a contemporary of E.W. Gruer, Dr. W.R. Lovegrave, A.J. Fink, E.J. Clarke, Dr. G.E.K. Branch, Bernardo Smith, W.H. Smith, J.F. Smyth, L. Rosenblatt, E.O. Fawcett and many other members of the Mechanics' Institute Hall of Fame. Arthur won the premier tournament of the Mechanics' Institute in 1908. He sometimes showed the inscribed gold medal to youngsters: One side read "Champion, Mechanics' Institute Premier Tournament." Then came his little joke when he showed the date on the reverse!

Stamer was in his seventies and was a retired superintendent of city deliveries, U.S. Post Office. He was secretary of the Mechanics' Institute Chess Club, and his death was a sore blow to the club. However, his brother Walter and his son Chet are still holding up the chess tradition of the family. (Chet won a special prize in the A.B. Stamer Memorial Tournament held in May, 1964).

#### ROBERT P. WILLSON

Bob Willson died in San Francisco in 1964 after a long illness. A member of the Mechanics' Institute and Castle chess clubs, Bob was a University of California Chess Club contemporary of our first editor, Dr. H.J. Ralston, and our present editor, Guthrie McClain. Bob played for the North team practically every year since 1932. His many friends send condolences to his widow, Mrs. Frances Willson.

This month's selections illustrate strongly the trend toward tries in the modern two-mover. In the first, the actual key is almost a joke: the interest lies in attempts by the White Queen to set up threats along the 4th rank.

The second shows a 'White Malf-Battery' -- another way of saying that the key move will come from one or the other of the White Knights, allowing his partner to participate in the play which follows. Either Knight, on moving, allows Black to check and gives Black a flight with his King.
