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SANTA MONICA - MARTIN, RIVISE, LESSING TIE FOR FIRST PLACE

Ray Martin, Irving Rivise, and Norman Lessing divided the cash and the honors at the invitational master-expert tournament held at the Santa Monica Bay Chess Club during January and February. Martin won the trophy by virtue of tie-breaking points. Martin, of course, holds numerous Santa Monica titles. Rivise is current California Open champion. Lessing is a strong player, now handicapped by lack of practice, whose reputation was earned in New York as a contemporary of Fine, Denker, and Reshevsky. The tournament had 22 players.

GOLDEN GATE CHESS CLUB - HENRY GROSS IS CLUB CHAMPION

In the annual tournament held at the Broadmoor Hotel between October and January, Henry Gross wrested the title from last year's champion, Bill Addison, as the latter became "overchessed" and withdrew. Eugene Krestini and Walter Pafnutieff tied for second.

TEAM MATCHES - MECHANICS INSTITUTE AND SACRAMENTO WIN TITLES

The strong Mechanics Institute Bishops beat out the tough team from Golden Gate to repeat as S.F. Bay Area team champions, while in the Central Valley league the improving Capital City team from Sacramento capped an uphill struggle which has been going on for two or three years by defeating defending champions San Jose in the last round.

SANTA MONICA MASTERS-EXPERTS -- MARTIN, RIVISE, LESSING TIE

Ray Martin, Irving Rivise and Norman Lessing tied for first place in the masters and experts tournament held at the Santa Monica Bay Chess Club during January and February. Martin, who had been the only undefeated player until the last round was played on March 1st, lost his final game to Rivise and both finished with 6-2 scores. Lessing equaled that score with a forfeit win from Charles Henderson.

The three divided the top cash prizes equally, each receiving \$60. Martin received the trophy by virtue of having the highest tiebreaking points. Sven Almgren and George Palmer received \$10 each for their $5\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ scores; the two drew a 140-move, 10-hour game in the last round, and a win for either player would have given him a first-place tie. A total of 22 players competed in the 8-round Swiss which was directed by Herb Abel. The scores:

Don Dalessi of Richmond won the B division $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, and 16-year-old om Maser of Pleasant Hill won the C division 5-0. A total of 109 layers were at the Oakland YMCA for the tournament on Feb. 28-Mar. 1. ill Stevens directed division A and George Koltanowski did the honors or B and C divisions.

EDVINS SIMANIS WINS HOLIDAY OPEN

Ed Simanis of Oakland won the holiday open at the Sheraton-Palace otel in San Francisco on December 13-14 by the clean score of 5-0. led for second were William Chapman and Carl Huneke of San Francisco, oth 4-1. David Krause, Palo Alto, George Bishop, Inglewood, and Ronld Thacker, Richmond, all scored $3\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$.

Eric Brent of San Francisco won in division B, $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, and Roderick reeman, a youngster from Monterey, cleaned up in division C by a core of 5-0.

There were 106 contestants, including 24 players in the four-man vents played on Saturday or Sunday. Tournament director George Kolanowski was assisted by Bill Stevens, Chuck McGinley and, of course, tah Koltanowski.

GOLDEN GATE CHESS CLUB - HENRY GROSS CLUB CHAMPION

Henry Gross won the 1958-59 club tournament $9\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$ in a 12-round Swiss which began October 21, 1958 and finished in January 1959. Gross was upset only once - by Carl Huneke - and allowed draws to last year's champ Bill Addison, Eugene Krestini, and Walter Pafnutieff. Krestini, who tied with Pafnutieff and took second on tiebreaking points, was knocked out of a first-place tie by Jules Kalisch in the last round. Pafnutieff, who lost only to Addison, gave up five draws and appeared to be out of practice.

Bill Addison dropped out after eight rounds with a good score of $6\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ and the hardest games over with. Addison was evidently "chessed out" after playing in just about every tournament locally for several years. It has been rumored that he was last seen on the way to Mexico for a rest. Jack Hursch also withdrew, after five rounds with a score of 3-2.

As usual, the Golden Gate tournament was a big event, drawing from both sides of the Bay. It was played on Tuesday nights at the Hotel Broadmoor and was directed by Henry Gross and Spencer Van Gelder.

OUTHERN CALIFORNIA CHESS LEAGUE

As the team tournaments were being scheduled in February, the ollowing were elected to guide the league during 1959: President, lan Carpenter of Pasadena; Vice-President, Herbert T. Abel of Santa onica; Secretary, Fred Haeger of San Gabriel; Treasurer, Ralph agedorn of Sun Valley; Tournament Director, H. D. Rader of South an Gabriel. Rader also is rating statistician.

The team tournaments have a total of 35 teams and there are no oss than 350 players involved. In Class I there are six teams, playing 4-man matches. Class II has two sections, East and West, who play x-man teams. There are ten teams in each section. In Class III here are nine six-man teams. Players in Class I are masters and exerts. Players in Class II range from Class C to experts, and Class II comprise B and C players.

Champions in 1958 were U.C.L.A. in Class I, Santa Monica in Class i-West, Inglewood in Class II-East, and the California Bank in Class II. In Class II, a playoff between the two top teams of each section as won by Pasadena, which thereby became champions of Class II as a lole.

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GAME OF THE MONTH - THAT FINAL ROUND AT SANTA MONICA

Ray Martin was sitting pretty with one round to go in the 1959 Santa Monica masters-experts invitational tournament. He had given up only two draws so far and was leading with a 6-1 score, there being four players tied for second with 5-2 scores.

He faced his old rival, Irving Rivise, in the final round. As is always the case when a series is going between two chessplayers, there is a lot of juggling and finagling for position. Martin attempted a surprise variation but this is hard to do with the black pieces, and particularly difficult against an old campaigner such as Rivise, who is the current California Open champion and is an ex-State champion. The outcome of the game has been reported. Rivise won and plunged the tournament into a three-way tie.

BOOK REVIEW: 1958 INTERZONAL TOURNAMENT PORTOROZ by The British Chess Magazine-76 pages-(\$2.00)

This is the second in the BCM Quarterly series of tournament books -- and typical of BCM it is tastefully and concisely produced. Although there are no diagrams, the game scores are clearly printed in the English descriptive notation, without notes, carefully cross-referenced as to openings, opponents, etc. And the authors have left little in doubt about the nature of this great tournament, with the results of the nine Zonal tournaments leading up to the Interzonal and a full explanation of the World Championship Cycle. It is a complete tournament book.

And, as it happened, the tournament itself proved to be one of the most interesting dramas in recent chess history. For one thing, it marked the entry of Fischer into international prominence (against even greater odds than Capablanca faced in 1911 when he took his place in the chess world). Then there was the shock of Bronstein losing to tail-ender Cardozo in the last round, thereby failing to qualify for the Candidates' Tournament (and there is more to that story, too). Something of an inspiration to chessplayers who are not prodigies was the showing of Benko. Rated third in Hungary, now without a country but residing in the U.S., Benko took third place almost on determination alone. And for once the Russians were conspicuously absent from the top six places (Tal, the winner, is Latvian; Petrosian, fourth place, is Armenian). No less than eight Grandmasters finished below them, Benko, Fischer, Gligoric and Clafsson.

Tournament books, it seems to me, are often overlooked as being merely "records", whereas they are usually as exciting as a good novel. Here you can follow the round-by-round fortunes of Fischer, on his way to qualifying for the Candidates Tournament for the World Championship. Here you can see the ex-World Title Challenger Bronstein stumbling at the finish line -- against "unknown" Cardozo and De Greiff. And, of course, you can observe the winnowing of opening variations throughout the tournament (and probably pick up a few ideas yourself).

I can always recommend a tournament book -- but this one especially.


