Looking Around: The Steinitz Memorial tournament in Prague was won by Dr. M. Filip of Czechoslovakia who scored 13-6; runnerup was V. Ragozin, USSR, with 12½; S. Flohr, 12 . . . The gigantic 100 vs. 100 telephone chess match between British and Dutch universities was won by the British team, scoring 56½-43½. Thirteen of Britain's leading universities—including Oxford, Cambridge, London, Dublin—competed.
