

White "X" to move and win! I P-R4!, K-B2; 2 K-N5, K-N2; 3 P-B4, and wins. For if 3 ..., K-B2; 4 K-R6, K-B3; 5 K-R7, K-B2; 6 P-N3, K-B3; 7 K-N8, K-K3; 8 K-N7, and Black can no longer defend his pawns.

FRENCH DEFENSE

Here from our match against Burlingame, is DAN McLEOD with the Black pieces. White is J. White.

1 P-K4, P-K3 3 PxP, PxP 2 P-Q4, P-Q4

The exchange variation; not played too often, as it is very "drawish."

7 0-0, 8-KB4 4 B-Q3, B-Q3

5 KN-K2, KH-K2 8 BxQB3, ...

6 B-KB4, 0-0

Never take in the opening - always retake. Black developes his Q. Better for White was QN-Q2, or B3.

11 P-Q83, QR-K1 8 ..., QxB

9 N-N3, B-N3 12 R-K3, P-KB4

10 R-K1, N-Q2

B-K2 has the advantage, and must push before White developes his Q-side.

13 Q-Kl, ... White sets up a trap: if P-B5 for Black White plays R-K6, and Black loses his Q

14 R-K6, ... 13 ..., N-KB3

A waste of time; White must return the rook, or have it trapped.

17 N-81, P-86 14 ..., Q-Q2

15 R-K2, P-B5 18 PxP?, ...

16 BxB, NxB

Better is RxR, RxR; 19 N-K3

18 ... N-R5 21 K-B1, QXN 19 NBB-Q2, NxPch 22 R-K3, ... 20 NxN, Q-N5ch

White is lost; if RxR, Black plays Q-R8ch and wins. If 22 R-K5, N-N5

22 ..., RxR 24 K-K2, R-K7

23 QxR, Q-R8ch

and Black wins. White violated the principle of development in the opening. From move #14 on, Mas he was theoretically playing 2 pieces down.

SICILIAN DEFENSE

Here, from our opening match against the Daly City Knights is the game on board #1, annotated by the winner FRED SCHOENE. MCO 10, Pg 207, Col 101. White F Schoene, Black J Lemke.

All "book" so far. With this move, White leaves the book. I prefer this to book 11 R-Q1

14 N3-K2, P-K4 hagavisa bas . sach

0-0 is better

Now White takes over. Black gets more play with 20 ..., B-Q6; 21 R-B2, P-K5;

22 QxQ, RxQ; 23 N-B4, PxB, etc. 21 QxB, Q-Q3 24 PxR, QxPch 22 B-85, RxB 25 K-R1, Q-K2

23 R-R8ch, 8-07 26 N-N3, restans

The threats of 27 N-B5, and R-Q1 are hard to answer.
