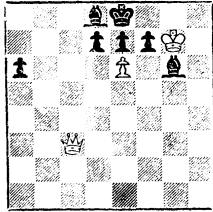

LOYOLA UNIVERSITY: WEINBERGER AGAIN WESTCHESTER CHAMPION

Tibor Weinberger of Glendale won the second Westchester Open in February, scoring $5\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ in the six-round Swiss to edge out Walt Cunningham of Arcadia, who had 5-1. Eight players tied for third place.

HOLLYWOOD: RIVISE WINS STEINER CLUB TITLE

Irving Rivise topped a strong field to win the 1962 Herman Steiner Chess Club championship, 9-2. There followed Jack Moscowitz, Tibor Weinberger, and Zoltan Kovacs — all separated by a half-point.

BERKELEY: BURGER WINS CASTLE CLUB TITLE

Bob Burger won a close tournament held during 1961, $11\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$. Henry Gross was second, 11-2, and Val Zemitis, 1960 club champion, was third, 10-3.

CENTRAL VALLEY: SALINAS TEAM UPSETS SAN JOSE AND SACRAMENTO

The Salinas team was undefeated after four rounds of the 1961-62 team matches. Former champions San Jose and Sacramento were in second and fourth places, respectively.

SAN FRANCISCO: INDUSTRIAL LEAGUE TEAMS IN CLOSE RACE

The San Quentin and Bank of America teams led the Bay Area Industrial League after six rounds. The two teams from the Pacific Gas and Electric Company were also still in the running.

WEINBERGER REPEATS AS WESTCHESTER WINNER, Feb. 16-18, 1962

Tibor Weinberger is again Westchester Open Champion as the result of a $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ score in the 6-round Swiss held February 16-18 at Loyola University. Weinberger came from behind in the last round to defeat Walt Cunningham, who had won his first five games. Our readers will remember that in 1961 Weinberger beat Larry Evans in the last round of the same tournament -- a game which became famous.

Cunningham was a clear second, 5-0, and there were eight men tied for third: Imre Barlai, formerly from San Diego; S. Wanetick, formerly from Philadelphia; Bob Jacobs; E. Wicher, a promising newcomer; Irving Rivise; John Jaffray; Paul Quillen, returning after a long absence; and E. Warner.

The tournament was directed by Herbert T. Abel, who handled the 64 contestants admirably. In addition to the main event, a Reserves event was held simultaneously for players either unrated or below 1500. Erlandson topped this 29-player field with a score of $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, followed by Seibert, also $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ but second on tie-breaking points.

BURGER WINS CASTLE CHAMPIONSHIP

Bob Burger wrested the 1961 Castle Chess Club championship away from Henry Gross by a dramatic last-round victory. Burger scored $11\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ losing only to Guthrie McClain and allowing a draw to Mark Eudey.

Gross was the early leader, having lost only in the fifth round to Eugene Lien, when the tournament arrived at its scheduled finish in November with a number of unplayed games. Burger had the burden of playing five or six games in a short space of time, and he stumbled once, against McClain, to fall half a point behind Gross. But he won the crucial game. Then Val Zemitis came under doctor's orders not to play chess for a time, giving Burger a free point.

Zemitis was a good third, scoring 10-3 in spite of the forfeit. Lee Hyder, a newcomer to the club, was fourth, 9-4.

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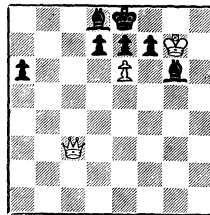
TASKS: This month's tasks were selected as examples of basic strategy in the 3-mover. White's second move creates double threats, or a single threat with a mate held in reserve for Black's only defense. White's threats depend on either obstructing Black "lines" or creating White "lines."

Solutions: No. 182 (The San Francisco Endgame): Solvers were most frequently misled by an early exchange of Queens: 1. K-Q7, Q-Kt1; 2. Q-Q8, Q-B1; 3. Q-K8, but, of course 3... Q-Q3ch draws at once. The more subtle 2. Q-K8, Q-B1; 3. Q-Q8 is met, not by Q-Q3ch (losing), but by Q-B4; 4. K-K8, K-Kt1 and the Pawn can be defended. Indeed, the point of White's play is to attack the Bishop Pawn from K7, when Black cannot well defend it from Kt1 with his King. Therefore: 1. K-Q7, Q-KKt1; 2. Q-Q6 (Reams of analysis have been written to show that Q-B4 fails because White must be able to interpose his Queen at Q7 after 2... Q-QR1 and Q-Kt2ch.), Q-B1; 3. Q-Q5 (the only move to hold the Queen to the guard of the Pawn), K-Kt1; 4. Q-K5 (tempoing, to get back to Q6 with Black on the move), K-R1; 5. Q-K7, K-R2; 6. Q-Q6. Now the square K7 is open and Black must give it up to the hostile King. 6... Q-QR1; 7. K-K7, Q-Kt1; 8. Q-B6, Q-QR1 (or Q-QB1; 9. Q-Q7, when Black must stop playing "tag" with the Queen and the Pawn falls); 9. Q-B7, K-Kt1 (or Q-QKt1; 10. Q-Q8, etc.); 10. Q-Q8ch, K-R2 and White wins the Pawn with either 11. K-K8 or Q-K8.

No. 183 (Duras): Not 1. R-QB2, K-Q2; 2. R-B2ch, K-Q1; 3. R-B6 (hoping for K-Q2; 4. R-Q6ch!), R-Q8 and White is nowhere. 1. R-Q6! at once, and if 1... R-QB8 (or KxR; 2. K-B8, etc.); then 2. R-QB6! and the Pawn must Queen.
