After two months of grueling, ruthless, complex, energy draining and otherwise informal easygoing chess playing; Fremont CC has declared its 1977 Chess Champion. Chris Mavreadis (1860) toppled our clubs top ten with a score of 8 wins and I loss. Along with the congratulatory honors, Chris recieves the Perpetual Knight Trophy and an invitation to play in this years CAL CHESS Individual Championships. Second place with 7:2 goes to Hans Poschmann (1534). His performance was actually better than his score indicates. He beat all of the top finishers (dealing Chris his only loss) only to succumb to two players with relatively low scores.

To prove that "to the victor goes the spoils", Hans has been awarded the lifetime title of honorary Fremont CC Tournament Director. In addition to this title, due to his extraordinary woodpushing abilities, Hans will be bestowed the honor of making the next 500 wooden plaques and trophies for future club winners. Congratulations, Hans, you deserve it (for beating me that is - Ed.)!

Fremont's annual "Knockout" That was won this year by Kenny Fong (1617). The tense elimination tournament, which decreases the field of players in half each round, finally was narrowed down to a two man battle between Kenny and Robert Pellerin (1538). In one corner we had Robert at 5' 11", weighing in at 200 lbs; In the other, Kenny, standing at 4' 5" (with shoes on) and tipping the scales at 65 lbs. (after inbetween meal snacks). When the dust settled the young upstart hooked his opponents king and was awarded the KO. This final game, which deemed the Ebony Rook to the "kid" is given elsewhere in this issue.

In April a six round speed tournament was won by Ernest Curto with a score of 4: 2. Actually three other persons tied with four points but Ernie hacked through a thicket of playoff games to emerge the victor.

Lacking some of our top players, Fremont CC ran aground in the recent CAL CHESS Team Championships. Finishing with a dis appointing 6: 14 mark, the team stumbled into sole possesion of last place in the premier division. Hans Poschman directed the 5 round regional event and played on board four.
