Happy Birthday!

PRECITA VALLEY CHESS CLUB AND CHESS HERALD ONE YEAR OLD MARCH 15TH !!! Celebration on Friday at 8 p.m.

The Precita Valley Chess Club and CHESS HERAID will have a birthday on Friday, March 15, 1957. Though the Community Club itself is over 36 years old, the chess club was not begun until Thursday, March 15, 1956. This was the chess club's first meeting night and exactly six woodpushers initiated the new chess club -- , Bob Blakemore, Paul Bogosian, John Ramirez, Noel Renaud, Jim Reynolds, and Ivan Vegvary. The first official members were the three "R's" with the other three signed up the very next week. At this writing there are 25 official members of the chess club. though the Community Center boasts a membership of over 600. So, we have come a long way since that first meeting last March.

CHESS HERAID is also one year old as it was presented on the opening night of the club, but as a Weekly Chess Bulletin. CHESS HERAID was issued 22 weeks in succession or until August 9, 1956 and then came out as a montly periodical in September, 1956.

A little celebration, therefore, is called for. The call has been answered and so a little buffet and meeting is scheduled for Friday, March 15th, here at our regular quarters in the Precita Valley Community Center. It is hoped that all members will be able to attend and enjoy the little knickknacks along with coffee and discuss future plans. See page 6 for the past year highlights.

LEIGHTON ALIEN WINS P.V. "OPEN"!!!
VEGVARY TAKES "OPEN" B CHAMPIONSHIP!!
HUENAGEL WINS "OPEN" C CHAMPIONSHIP!

With James Cook scoring a win over Noel Renaud in the last round of the club's Swiss System tourney, Leighton Allen emerged as the "open" champ of the Precita Valley Chess Club for 1957. All top three players came out with 5-1 scores, but Allen managed to top Renaud and Cook with Sonenberger points. Noel Renaud ended up 2nd and James Cook 3rd. Leighton Allen, of course, well deserves his very first title at the club--, that of the "open" champ of 1957:

This, of course, made Ivan Vegvary the "open" B champion for 1957. Ivan managed to do this by upsetting Jim Reynolds in the last round and defying Reynolds' most well versed opening! As a matter of fact, Vegvary is the first to ever defeat Reynolds in a tourney in such an opening! Second for the "B" championship was Paul Bogosian, with a like score of 4-2, but behind in S.B. points by 12.

Capturing the "open" C championship of the club was Don Hufnagel with a score of 3-3 against the best the club had to offer. Don was not obliged to win his division by S.B. points as the next nearest "C" was Julio Ercolini who ended up with a score of 2-4.

As predicted the Swiss System tourney brought around some surprising results and only proves that if you stay in there and keep plugging you might end up with a championship of a sort. Complete scores can be found on page 5.

One thing "Mac", as Guthrie McClain is called by his friends, does deserve is credit for editing a fine periodical in THE CALIFORNIA CHESS REPORTER, official organ of the California State Chess Federation. Through this publication "Mac" has more or less been the guiding light of the CSCF. Mr. McClain, of course, does much for the organization as chairman of their board of directors. He is also V.P. of the USCF.

"Mac" was on a team representative of this area a few years ago that went on a European tour. This particular team was not out to be a world beater, the idea mainly being to create some friendship in chess circles between our country and those in Europe.

Getting back to his rating, McClain was surprised to find himself rated a master last year, considering other rated experts of California his betters. "Mac" says he will not be a master long, quote, "I did lousy in the U.S. open!". He figures Henry Gross, who we introduced in the last issue, a better player. Strange as it seems, "Mac" always seems to manage to come up with the white pieces whenever playing for the championship against Gross in the Castle Chess Club! It seems he was the T.D. there. Perhaps, since he considers Henry to be the better player, that Mr. Gross should be handicapped with the black pieces!

Bob Blakemore is the regular "C" champ. Their's were earned through a hard fought round robin schedule.

As was said, the Swiss System has a habit of bringing around unexpected results, but it is a nice way to bring about other titles to hopefuls who regularly attend the club. The tourney was expected to end something like 1. Renaud, 2. Cook, 3. Reynolds, and 4. Allen, etc. As it was the youthful and upcoming Leighton Allen, student at Mission High School, came through with flying colors. His feat was not an easy one as he approached the tourney with a sort of quiet confidence. He started right off by defeating co-champ James Cook, and then taught Jim Reynolds a lesson in the 2nd round. In the 3rd he beat the ever improving Ivan Vegvary. He was finally bested by Noel Renaud, the other co-champ, in the 4th, but went on to defeat Ed Russell and the club's "B" champ, Bob Blakemore.

Ivan Vegvary also earned the "open" B championship, his most surprising win being over Jim Reynolds in the last round. We can only repeat our prediction about this young fellow (14 years old) from Hungary, --that is, he will be a great grandmaster someday. Ivan's main fault is hurrying his moves. When he sits down to think out his game he is almost invincible, but he still has a little of that youthful impatience and begins to play like an old "rapid-transit king" and throws away good positions. Ivan, of course, is a full fledged American now. Let's hope that this country's many attractions does not take him away from us and Caissa! There's no glory in chess in America, but perhaps, someday, and even in Ivan's time, this will change!

Don Hufnagel, our now "open" C champ is also a youngster, a student at Balboa High School. Remember that Don finished dead last in the regular championship tourney, so his 3-3 score in the Swiss is definitely an improvement. Don would probably be better in the game, too, but even as his mother says, "He has too many irons in the fixet". Don is an all around sport and it seems that chess is secondary to him. Just imagine how good a player he would be if he concentrated on the game!!! --And, remember, --all winners in this tourney are teenagers!!! Watch out you veterans!!!!

FIRST ANNIVERSARY - ONE YEAR OF HIGHLIGHTS AT THE PRECITA VALLEY CHESS CLUB

IT ALL STARTED WHEN Jim Reynolds met Miss Margaret MacDonald on a Saturday afternoon on March 3, 1956. The possibility of a chess club to cover the Mission District of San Francisco was discussed. It was agreed that such a club could meet on Thursday nights from 7 p.m. until 11 p.m. and the starting date was March 15, 1956. First Meeting Night - Six Players And A Hat

THE SAN FRANCISCO NEWS announced the opening of the Precita Valley Chess Club, but just the same only six players showed up (named on page 1). It was decided to get a ladder tourney going immediately, so all six names were written on slips of paper and put in a hat. The men took turns drawing a name. The first name drawn would be on the top rung and so on down the line. Noel Renaud's name was drawn for the top rung, and, strange as it may seem, he has been there ever since. Jim Reynolds name was drawn last so you can guess where he ended up. Immediately after the drawing, chess games were begun with Jim Reynolds quickly challenging John Ramirez for rung number four and getting it. Bob Blakemore defeated Ivan Vegvary for rung two. Noel Renaud defended his top rung from challenges from Paul Bogosian and Ivan Vegvary, and John Ramirez knocked Paul Bogosian from rung three. A first night of action!!!

A Charter Is Drawn Up And Approved By Ten Charter Members

NOT WISHING TO WASTE TIME on long drawn out meetings determining laws and who would do what, Jim Reynolds took it upon himself to be club director and appointed Noel Renaud as treasurer of the club. Jim also drew up a charter to govern the club---, it took many nights of deep thought. By May it was approved by ten charter members. It was agreed that anyone joining up by May 1st was entitled to be a charter member and could approve the charter by signing his name on the last page of it. Since then it has been available for members to read around the club quarters. Reynolds fixed it so he could be voted out of office by September of the same year, but an election retained him. Noel Renaud was also retained as treasurer.

First Team Match

PRECITA VALUEY HAD ITS FIRST TEAM match versus the Keres Chess Club. It was just a friendly match and Keres won it 4-2. This was on April 5th, and two weeks later, the team travelled for the first time, on April 20th, to play the Colle Chess Club, also in a friendly match, and managed to draw it 3-3.

Championship Tourney Started

ON THURSDAY, MAY 3, 1956 THE CIUB started its championship tourney and only 9 of 11 members entered the tournament. At about the same time the club entered into team competition for blood, entering in CMC's El Camino Real Chess League. Being that we were new, the dopesters had us finishing last—, but there was a lot of spirit in the Precita Valley Chess Club. The club decided to name its team SHOWALTER as CENC insists on masters' names for teams. So many masters' names were overused so it was soon decided to have our team honor the little heard of American master, Jackson Showalter. Our debut in the El Camino Real League was a 6-0 (!) shellacking of the Colle team, the same team we had drawn with in a friendly match.

Came the month of June and we had our club nomination for officers to be elected in September. This was done by secret ballots so as not to waste time and as stated to be done in our club charter.

Thursday, June 7, we took our first and only league defeat of the schedule from the Botvinnik team of the Carroll Ogden Club 4-2. Then, on June 9th, we travelled on up to San Quentin to win two matches for CENC teams, our Showalter team defeating the Lasker team of S.Q. 4-2 and the Keres team of S.Q. 5-1. On Thursday, June 14th, the Showalter team travelled to San Bruno to upset the defending champs of the league, the Evans team of the San Bruno Chess Club, 4-2:

THURSDAY, AUGUST 9TH WAS A BIG NIGHT at Precita Valley--, the club had two team matches going in two different club rooms. Showalter was hosting the Alekhine team of the Marin Chess Club (San Rafael), and our Keres team was hosting the Colle team. While the Keres team was losing, the Showalter team was winning $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ and along with the victory the El Camino Real League team championship; Colle came in 2nd.

Renaud And Cook Become Co-Champions

JAMES COCK AND NOTE REMAUD battled to a draw on September 6th and this ended the club's championship tourney in a draw: The Club director had neglected to make a provision in case of a tie, so to solve matters, declared them co-champions--; both were presented with a trophy on "Presentation Night", September 20th. Bob Blakemore won the "B" championship and Jack Craig took the "C" championship. They also got trophies. Also on "Presentation Night" our Showalter team was presented with a trophy from the CENC tournament director. James Cook donated medals to the individual members of the team. Don Hufnagel received a consolation prize and Bob Blakemore's wife donated extra prizes for the champs and the club director. The club also held a speed "rapid-transit" tourney on this same night and the winners were Bill Stevens, Noel Renaud, Richard Moreno, and Ed Russell. Results of the club election were announced, too--: they were club director, Jim Reynolds; ass't. club director, Paul Bogosian; treasurer, Noel Renaud; secretary, Ivan Vegvary; and team captain, James Cook (who has since resigned).

A SPACHETTI FEED WAS HELD by the club on October 23rd in hopes to raise funds, and though everybody had a fine time, the club merely ended up with a plus of about \$6. December 6th started the just ended Swiss System tourney.
