The above result came about in the final round of the C.C.C.L. current championship and determined the ownership of the trophy (or possession rather!) for the ensuing year. Sacramento trailed San Jose by half-point in matches, having drawn with Fresno earlier in the season, and needed a clear-cut win. Now, next year promises to be the best yet in our League play.

## Central California Chess League INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The C.C.C.L. Individual Championship will be held March 28-29 in Modesto. The tournament will be a 4-round Swiss, and will be open to any player who has played at least one (1) League match during the past season. President Mattingly will appoint the Tournament Committee. The entry fee has not been definitely set, as we do not know how much rent will have to pay, but will probably be \$5. Whatever is not used for rent we will have for prize money. It is tentatively planned to allow a maximum of 16 players in the Championship section. If the entry list warrants, a Reserve Section will be established; and if necessary, a Minor Section. It is hoped we can give generous prizes in all sections.

Club secretaries will be notified of the details in the near future, and are requested to send the list of entries from their respective clubs to the Tournament Director or the League Secretary, N. T. Austin.

## SACRAMENTO CITY CHAMPIONSHIP

The date for this event has not as yet been set, but will be held over a weekend later this spring. It is planned to stage a 5-round Swiss, which will be open to any resident of "greater" Sacramento, and also to any member of the Capital City Chess Club residing in the nearby area.

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In the Sacramento Chess News, as well as to chessplayers in general, it has been the custom to refer to our club merely as the "Sacramento Chess Club", altho our official name is the CAPITAL CITY CHESS CLUB. With the appearance of another club in local chess circles, which uses the name "Sacramento Chess Club", it is important that we constantly use our correct name - always and only. The new Club meets on Thursday night at the Turn Verein, with Ray Richards as its first president. Beyond these bare facts, we have no information. So please remember, from now on, it is "Capital City Chess Club".

The pitcher went to the well once too often, and San Jose's long winning streak came to an end at long last. With the score of  $6\frac{1}{2}$  -  $3\frac{1}{2}$  in favor of Sacto., Bill Adams offered Ray Richards the draw and allowed Sacramento to cinch the match. As an anticlimax, Sacramento scored  $1\frac{1}{2}$  points in the remaining two games. Contrary to prematch dope, the match was decided on the six top boards, where Sacto scored 5 - 1. Both teams came loaded on the bottom boards, where the score was  $3\frac{1}{2}$  -  $3\frac{1}{2}$ .

Sacramento, after a near disastrous first round tie with Fresno, came thru strongly, and was in fine shape for the decisive last round. They thus regained the trophy after a three year drought.

San Jose suffered their second defeat in four seasons of League play. They had won every match since an early season defeat by Modesto in 1949. They had an impressive record, and were actually the better team in games won and lost.

Pittsburg, improving every year, might have been closer still but for an unfortunate let-down against Modesto. They made it very close against both the leaders at the top boards.

Stockton was barely nosed out by Pittsburg for third place. The addition of Reid, Leigh and David-Malig, together with the development of Ellinberg, strengthened their middle boards, and will make them a factor to be reckoned with next year.

Fresno was potentially one of the strongest in the League, but, after the Sacto match, insisted on leaving half their strength at home. Maybe next year they will come into their own.

Modesto fielded a team of veterans, the same team that had won in 1949-50. They need an infusion of younger blood, altho the Pittsburg match was won by the venerable Dr. Cook, who picked off a much needed win at 7th board.

Oakdale didn't have the guns this year, altho they managed to nose out Visalia for 7th. Mrs. C. J. Smith is probably the best of her sex in the League, and holds her own with the men.

Visalia showed promise, but lacked experience. They were generally barely outplayed at every board. They were forced to forfeit one board in their crucial match with Oakdale. C. Fotias made an excellent score at 2nd and 3rd boards.

Bob Burger won the prize for best score at 1st board, allowing only one draw to Milt Meyer. The younger players came into their own, placing three in the first four. Only Milt Meyer was able to post an even score against Burger, Hailpam and Kirby.

Next year we predict that Fresno, Pittsburg, and Stockton will be definite threats to keep Sacramento and San Jose from retiring the trophy.

Meyer, Gee, O. Celle, Russell and Austin played in all of Sacramento's matches scoring 27 - 8. The best individual records were made by Bob Burger of Pittsburg and Bill Adams of San Jose, who scored  $6\frac{1}{2}$  -  $\frac{1}{2}$  at first and second boards respectively.

San Jose established a new record when they blanked Oakdale 12 - 0, and the Sacramento-San Jose match set a new record with 13 boards.

Janis Kalnins of San Jose finally had his long string of victories ended, but only after setting a record of 12 consecutive wins and 13 consecutive games without a loss. However, Ojars Celle of Sacramento is working on an unfinished run of 11 games without a loss. Three men finished the season with 5 wins in a row, Austin in Sacramento, Daugherty of San Jose, and Loera, Pittsburg.

Noel Austin of Sacramento, and Jeff Smith of Oakdale and Modesto, enjoy the distinction of having played in all their teams' matches since the League was organized, 27 in all. If any one can show more than 18 wins, please let us know. That is the most we have on record.

OFF THE CHESS

Sacramento beats San Jose and regains the trophy! Wow! Frankly, I'm gonna admit I didn't think we could do it. But, now that it's done, perhaps even San Jose will allow the victors a little rejoicing. So, once again, WOW!!

The League trophy is in hot dispute. Sacramento and San Jose have won it twice, Modesto once. And three times will give permanent possession. Next year may tell the tale. Still, all the teams in the League, outside of San Jose and Sacramento, can be depended upon to redouble their efforts to stay in the running. And San Jose and Sacramento will be equally determined to carry off the trophy permanently. All in all, it will make the coming season an interesting one for valley chess.

Sacramento's Capital City Chess Club has a new President, Howard Evanson. I'd been so out of touch with things that I'll confess that I didn't even know Howard until after he was elected. But I do now. He's a real live-wire and has been working hard in behalf of the Club.

One of the most common misconceptions of the Capital City Chess Club (even among its own members) has been that there was a small, entrenched clique which for some mysterious purpose, ran things to suit only themselves. I heard all about that when I first joined, and I still hear it, now and then, sometimes with myself (very flatteringly) being mentioned as a member of the clique.

I think the real reason for this criticism has been that, as in all clubs, only a very few are active and they do all the work. Well, I hope the election of Howard Evanson as President, good as it is in every other way, will also help to dispell this myth of a ruling clique. Because Howard has been a member only a year. It was his industry and ability that gained him the office, and clearly not membership in a small group.

Those Rooshians of San Francisco won the Bay Area title. A match was suggested between the Russians and Sacramento for the Northern California title. Unfortunately, the only date the Russians would play was on the weekend of our League championship. Also, like the Mechanics Institute, the Russians won't travel to play chess.

The last time Capital City played the Rooshians, we won, and we travelled to San Francisco to do it. They promised to play a return engagement up here--but have never done so. I guess we'll just have to let it go at that. On the face of it, they probably have a better team, since there are many fine players in their ranks. Yet, chess doesn't always go that way. In fact, the last time we played, they were supposed to win. They didn't.

I have always been amused by the provinciality of people who live in the larger cities. It even applies to chess. The Mechanics Institute (to avoid picking on the Russians) even forfeited a match rather than travel to Oakland--less than ten miles! How about that?

And I'll bet the Manhattan and Marshall Chess Clubs of New York are even more provincial. I doubt anybody could induce them to leave their home area. All I can say is that they wouldn't get very far in our Valley League--with that attitude.

**CHESS TIP:** More and more, you'll find players "sacrificing" the exchange, that is, trading a rook for a bishop or knight. If connected with any positional advantage, such a "sacrifice" often wins the game. So, look over those exchanges pretty closely before you reject a trade of a rook for a minor piece. It might be just the thing to do.

**HAUGHTY CHESS:** Of course, I couldn't consider a bishop as less in power than a rook anyway. Not after I promoted them the other day. I got tired of playing with bishops and from now on I start the game with two Archbishops. (Think I'll get any better results?)
