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MINUTES OF CCCL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING 9/20/53

In the absence of the President and Vice-President the meeting was called to order by Secretary N. T. Austin. Present were Wm. T. Adams, San Jose; Frank Olvera, Pittsburg; E. L. Jeffers, Modesto; M. Hailpann, Fresno; Elmer Achtenberg, Visalia; C. J. Smith, Oakdale; M. A. Sanders, Stockton; and N. T. Austin, Sacramento.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read, as were the Treasurer's Report, and the financial reports on the Individual Championship Tournament and the State Championship Qualify-

ing Tournament.

The following officers were unanimously elected, Wm. T. Adams,

President; C. J. Smith, Vice-President; and N. T. Austin, Secy-Treas.
A spirited discussion was held on the subject of team size. It was decided to continue under the present rules for the coming season, and to appoint a committee to study the subject and report at the next meeting.

As Visalia will not field a team this year, but desires to maintain membership, a discussion was held on their voting eligibility. It was decided that Visalia should have full voting rights.

The Secretary was ordered to publish the rules of play in the

next Sacramento Chess News.

A schedule for the coming season prepared by N. T. Austin, was approved and dates were set for each round. a starting time of one pm for all matches was agreed upon. If a team has not appeared by this time, clocks shall be started from the 1st board down.

It was agreed to continue holding two tournaments annually as at present. The President was instructed to appoint a Tournament

Committee to plan for these events.

It was decided to drop the \$5 prize for best score at 1st board in League matches, and substitute a \$5 prize for best score at any board, ties to be decided in favor of the player playing the lowest (numbered) average board.

Even if he does not eliminate it, what the heck, I'll bet Gross, Steiner and Poliakoff will still keep both eyes on him, all the time. Because at his best, Bob is terrific. And even when he's off his game, he can still beat most

of us.

In conclusion, I want to urge all chess players to do their best for their team (especially Sacramento). Not being prejudiced at all, at all, I also urge them to play their durndest. Of course, if they're gonna make any mistakes, I would prefer them to be made when playing against Sacramento. Or is that too much to ask?

Yes, yes, I know. Of course it is.

RULES FOR CONDUCT OF GCCL TEAM MATCHES

Foreword: Surprisingly enough, no one set of rules has ever been officially approved by the Executive Committee. However, certain rules have been tacitly accepted by all the Clubs, and these, together with Executive Committee actions, constitute the following:

1. Eligibility of Players: All bona fide members of CCCL Clubs are eligible for League competition. No player shall compete for more than one club during a season. Unanimous approval must be obtained from the Executive Committee before a new player cur-

rently competing in another league may be used.

2. Size of Teams: Teams shall consist of a minimum of six (6) players. Team Captains shall agree to the number of boards to be

played, prior to each match.

- 3. Game Forfeitures: A team consisting of less than six (6) players shall forfeit the remaining boards up to board six. Also, the home team shall forfeit all boards less than the agreed number. No forfeitures may be claimed if both teams travel. The lowest board shall be forfeited first, i.e. the top boards must be filled in order.
- 4. Colors and Lineups: Colors on 1st Board shall alternate each season. At each board, the captain whose team has White shall name his man, after which the other captain shall name his man to play Black.

5. Starting Time: Games shall start at 1 pm unless otherwise

agreed. Clocks may be started at 1 pm, beginning with 1st board.

6. Adjournments and Adjudications: Previous to the match, the Team Captains shall agree upon time of adjournment and method of adjudication.

7. Team Championship: The Team Championship shall be decided on the basis of matches won, ties to count as 1/2. In the case of

a tie, percentage of games won shall decide.

8. Rules for Individual Play: Play shall be governed by the latest F.I.D.E. Rules of Play.

9. Time Limit: The time limit shall be 40 moves in two hours, and 20 moves each hour thereafter. No player may refuse to play with clocks if his opponent so requests.

10. Game Scores: No player may claim a win on time unless he has kept an accurate and legible score. A player must keep his

own score if a score is kept.

11. Miscellaneous: While difficult to enforce, it is not ethical for a Team Captain, in advising a player whether to offer or accept a draw, to use any analysis of the position in question other than that of the player involved.

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
