White: G. Smith. Black: R. Thacker.

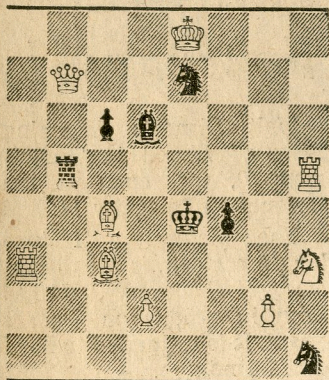
