This game decided the 'B' section winner in the last club tourney.

July 16, 1973 Sicilian Defence

David Mostardi Scott Griffin

- 1. e4 c5
- 2. Nf3 d6
- 3. d4 cd
- 4. N:d4 Nf6
- 5. Nc3 a6

Nadjorf Variation Black prepares queenside counter-play and sneaks a peek at White's attacking plan.

- 6. Bg5 e6
- 7. f4 Be2
- 8. Qf3 Qc7

This keeps an eye on e5 and prevents the White bishop from taking up a good post on c4.

9. 0-0-0 0-0

Spassky-Fisher, 15th match game went 9...Nbd7, which is the usual move in this position, supporting f6 and e5. 9...0-0 is perfectly playable, but not 9...b5?; 10.B:f6, B:f6; 11.B:b5+!,ab;12.Nd:b5 with a nasty attack.

10 g4 b5 11 B:f6 B:f6 12 g5 B:d4 13 R:d4 Nc6 14 Rd3

White has played well up to this point, but this is not a good place for the rook and leads to futher trouble. 14.Rd2 looks better. It holds the second rank against Black's counter'attack down the c file and will allow him to double rooks on the kingside quickly. d3 looks like the best place for the bishop, protecting the queenside and attacking the kingside.

14. ... Bb7 15. Re3 Rac8 16. a3

In positions with mutual attacks on opposite castled kings, the side which is forced to defend first loses. You simply don't have the time to defend. In the last few moves White's attack has stalled, and now Black's rolls into motion.

16. ... Nd4 17. Qg3 a5 18. b4 ...

With c2 undefended White can't allow the N to be pushed, so he has to make more weaknesses.

18. ... ab
19. ab e5
20. f5 N:f5!
21. ef B:h1
22. Bg2 B:g2
23. Q:g2 Qc4
24. Nd5 Rfe8
25. Nf6+! ...

Alert! 25...gf; 26.gf+, K-any; 27.Qg7 mate


25. ... Kh8 26. N:e8 R:e8 27. Rh3

Sloppy, Re4 was to be considered. Having negotiated the middle game complications well enough, White falls prey to plain old carelessness.

27. ... Qf4+ 28. Kd1 Q: f5 29. Qc6 Rc8 30. Qg2 g6 31. Rf3 Qe4 32. Qf2 Q: b4 33. R:f7? Qb1+ 34. Ke2 R:c2+ 35. Ke3 R: f2 36. K:f2 b4 White resigns

An exciting, fighting game.
