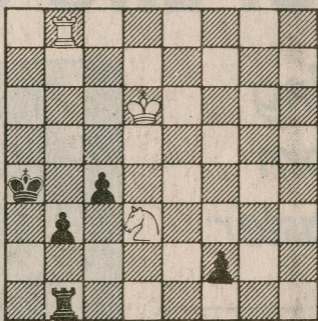

U.S. CHESS CHAMPIONSHIP, 1984

The 16 top chess players in the United States will face off in Berkeley from July 9 to July 28 for the title of U.S. Champion and a chance at the world championship.

During the tournament, which will be held at Pauley Ballroom on the U.C. Berkeley campus, each of the 16 players will play one game against each of the other contestants.

At the same time, the top 12 women chess players, including Pam Ford of San Francisco, will compete for the title of U.S. Women's Champion.

Tickets to the daily sessions are \$3. A season ticket to all 15 rounds is \$30.
