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### FIFTH ANNUAL OPEN AT SANTA MONICA

One of the great tournaments in this area in which anyone can participate is the fifth annual Pacific Southwest Open Chess Championship, to be held over the July 4 weekend at Joslyn Hall, Wilshire and Lincoln Blyds. in Santa Monica.

The prize fund will total over \$700, with a minimum of \$300 and a trophy to the winner. Other guaranteed prizes are \$150 for second and \$75 for third.

Trophies and smaller cash awards will go to the leaders in various rating categories, experts, Class A, Class B, Class C and unrated. Thus every entrant has a good chance to share in the prizes.

Seven rounds will played with Swiss system pairings, starting at 8 p.m. Friday, July 1. Two rounds each day will be completed Saturday through Monday, starting at 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m.


The entrance fee is \$12.50, which includes a rating fee to the U.S. Chess Federation. Membership in the federation is required, and can be obtained at time of registration, 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. before the first round on Friday.

The time limit will be 45 moves in 11/2 hours. This means the basic session for each game will be three hours, instead of four or five hour sessions as in previous similar tournaments.


