## GELLER, PETROSIAN LEAD CANDIDATES

The four Soviet grandmasters who have been in the van in the Candidates' Chess Tournament in Curacao remained closely grouped, all pulling further away from the second division as a result of two rounds completed last week.

Tigran Petrosion was the only double winner, defeating Bobby Fischer of Brooklyn and Miroslav Filip of Czechoslovakia. As a result Petrosian moved up to a tie for first at 9-5 with Ewfim Geller.

Geller had defeated world ampion Mikhail Tal (for the latter's eighth loss) and drawn with Pal Benko of New York. Geller and Petrosian have identical scores of four wins and 10 draws. They are the only un-

defeated players.
Paul Keres is in third place with 8½-5½. He beat Benko in the 13th round, then drew with I cher in the 14th. Fischer, gained an early advantage in this game, but could not score against Keres' resourceful defense. The game lasted 77 moves.

Fourth place was held by Victor Korchnol, who had an e en score for the week. He defeated Filip, then lost in two sessions to Tal. This was Tal's first win after three successive losses.

The prospects of Fischer's overcoming the two-point lead are slim at this stage. The winring score should be at least 18 points. To equal that Fischer would need 11 points of his remaining 14 games, almost 79%. It can be done, but it is a mighty task against this class of opposition.

Of the 56 games played to date, 27 were drawn, 15 were won by the black side and 14 by the white. Black gained a 4-0 result in the 18th round, in which the top ranking participants all happened to sit on that side. There have been relatively few short draws, most having been hard fought.

The players took a six-day holiday for a tour of the island in the Netherlands Antilles, site of the tournament. Play will be resumed this weekend, with pairings the same as in the first round.
