# Chess

### **NEW WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPION**

After holding her world's title since 1962 without interruption, Nona Gaprindashvili was dethroned Oct. 6 by her compatriot, 17-year-old Maiya Chiburdanidze. The final score in their scheduled 16-game match was 8½-6½, with the last game dropped, since it would not affect the outcome of the contest.

Chiburdanidze has had an unparalleled rise to fame in women's chess, having been awarded a master rating in the Soviet Union at age 13, qualified for the world's championship challenge matches at 15, won the USSR women's chess crown at 16, and now, at 17, become women's world champion.

(a) Stronger than 10 f4 cd 11 Bd4 e5.
(b) Better is 10. . .Rb8!, and if 11 g4, then 11. . .b5.
(c) The game resembles a Sicilian Defense, but with extra tempi for White.

- (d) Since trades ease the defense, preferable is 13 Rfd1. (e) Black must play 15. . .Nd7 here. (f) After 16. . .Ne8 17 Bb7 Qb7 18 ed ed 19 Qa5 White possesses an indisputable advantage.

(g) More active is 18. . .Qf3 to meet 19 Rfe1 with 19. . .h5.
(h) Too passive. King-side play by 19. . .h5 needs trying.
(i) Worthy of consideration was 22. . .f5, e.g., 23 Nb6 Qe8.
(j) Forced, since 24. . .Rd7 25 Ne7! Black a pawn.
(k) More stubborn resistance could be offered by 25. . .Nf5, e.g., 26 b4 e6 27 Nb6 Nd4 28 f4 e4!, with complications.
(1) Too late.

(m) The sacrifice of the exchange cannot be helped. Bad is 30. . .Qd7 31 Rd7 Bb4 32 b7 Bd6 33 Rd1! Bc7 34 Ba7.

(n) The move 32. . .Bb2 looks strong, anticipating 33 Qa4 e3, but White would respond with 33 Rd6! instead.

(o) An error in an already critical position. If, for instance, 37. . .h5, then 38 h4 Qh6 39 Rdf2 f5 40 Qd7 or, in this same line, 38. . .Qg4 39 Qa6, and it is unlikely that Black will survive in either case.
