(a) A supposed improvement on the old sequence, 11 . . . P-N3 12 R-B1 B-N2 13 B-QN5 R-B1 14 Q-R4 N-R4 15 P-Q5 Q-Q3 16 B-Q2 RxR 17 RxR P-B4 18 B-Q7 (Furman—Smyslov, XVII USSR Championship)

(b) In his manual on the Gruenfeld Defense, recommends 13 . . . P-K3 followed by . . . Q-K2, evaluating the position as equal. It is difficult to make a final judgment, however, and after the game Kapengut said that he avoided 13 . . P-K3 because he feared the reply 14 Q-R4.

(c) Now this move saddles Black with a serious pawn weakness, which Geller seizes upon instantly. Better is 14 . . .

Q-Q2.

(d) The queen proves vulnerable here. Black can tighten his defense by 16 . . . Q-K2 17 Q-N4 QR-Q1, although White

retains the advantage.

(e) But not 17 . . . B-B1, as White breaks through with 18 P-K5! QxP (or 18 . . . BxP 19 NxNP! with equally dire results) 19 BxKNP! PxB 20 NxNP Q-B3 21 NxR QxN 22 R-B7

(f) The beginning of a fine combination.

(g) If 20 . . . BxP, instead, then 21 BxPch K-R1 22 B-Q4 ruins Black, e.g., 22 . . . Q-QN4 23 P-QR4 Q-N5 24 NxPch!

(h) Beautifully unexpected, this shot by the rook crushes all resistance.

- R-N2 (23 . . . QxB 24 NxPch) 24 NxPch! QxN 25 QxQ PxQ 26 R-B7. Playing the queen to the only unattacked square also loses: 23 . . . Q-K4 24 NxPch PxN 25 Q D2 QxQ PxQ 26 Q-K4 24 NxPch PxN 25 Q-R3ch Q-R4 26
- (j) or 23 . . . R-B1 24 RxRch BxR 25 QxQ BxQ 26 B-Q4ch R-N2 27 R-B8.

(k) Giving Geller credit for seeing the obvious finish, RxR 25 QxQ BxQ 26 B-Q4ch R-N2 27 R-B7. Kapengut confessed that he actually felt relieved when he was writing down his resignation . . .
