CALCHESS TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS

The 1978 CalChess Tournament of Club Champions was held at the Centerville branch library in Fremont, Dec. 9-10. Eight Bay Area chess clubs sent representatives to determine the strongest CalChess affiliated club champion. First place winner Richard Dost of the Berkeley Chess Club will receive annual possession of a large perpetual trophy engraved with his name and the name of his club. Hans Poschmann organized and directed the four-round Swiss system event. Complete results:

1st, Richard Dost (2041), Berkeley Chess Club, 3½-½; 2nd, Raymond Musselman (1918), Monday Knights Chess Club, 3-1; 3rd-4th, Renard Anderson (1934), Palo Alto Chess Club, and Jon Wooley (1607), Capt. Anchovy's Chess Club, 2½-1½ each; 5th, Ernest Curto (1709), Fremont Chess Club, 1½-2½; 6th-8th, Eric Neilson (1632), Cal Poly Chess Club, Neil Regan (1855), Memorex Chess Club, and Paul Stainthorpe (1965), Campolindo High School Chess Club, 1-3

- (a) The black knight on d3 will have a firmer base than its counterpart on c6.
- counterpart on c6.

 (b) Black now stands better. White probably should have played 15 h3, which would have been met by 15... Nd3 and 16... Rfe8, with an edge for Black. On 15 Bf1, weakening the base of his knight on c6, Black responds with an eventual e6 and a gradual erosion of that post. If 15 Bg5, then simply 15
- (c) Not good, but 18 Be5 Be5 19 f4 Bg7 leaves Black threatening 20 . . . Bb7, so that after 20 e5 de 21 fe Be5 22 Ne5 Ne5 23 d6 Qc5 24 Kf1 Rcd8 25 Qd5 Qd5 26 Bd5 ed Black main-
- tains the advantage.
- (d) The move 21 e5 is answered by 21 . . . Qc5.

 (e) Originally, I had written down 22 . . . Rab8 on my score sheet, but then looked again and saw that White could play 23 Qa4, so I scratched it out. The move actually made was
- directed at keeping White's counterplay to a minimum.

 (f) White can undertake little else; he expected 23...d5 in
- reply.

 (g) Similar variations occur after 23 Bg2. Correct is 23 gf Ra8, which would be about equal. Note, too, that 23 Qh1 succumbs to 23 . . . gf 24 Kg3 Qc7 25 Kg2 Ra8 26 Qh2 Bb7 27 Kf1 Qc5, followed by 28 . . . Ra6 or even 28 . . . Ra5.
- (h) Figuring that the knight in this position is stronger than
- the rook.

 (i) Certainly not 32 Bb7 on account of 32 . . . Qg1mate.

 Moves like 32 Rdd2 (32 Red2, 32 a4) lose to 32 . . . Bg2 33 Rg2

 Qf3 34 Ke1 Nf4, etc. Nor does 32 Ne4 help in view of 32 . . . Be4,
- and 32 Bh3 fails against 32 . . . Qh3 33 K-any Bf3.

 (j) Here White loses less quickly with 34 Rdd2 Ne2.
