(b) Black seems to have held the center well enough and now appears ready for action on the Queen side, but

White breaches the enemy line at its most fortified

point!

(d) Tal took a long time on his reply to this move, and with good reason. If, for example, 21 . . .NxR then White forces checkmate with 22 P-R5ch KxP 23 P-N4ch K-N3 24 Q-B5ch K-R3 25 Q-R7ch KxN 26 Q-R5ch K-B5 27 Q-B5mate.

(e) The only move. An immediate loss is 22 . . .KxP 23
P-N4ch K-R3 24 Q-R2ch! KxN 25 Q-R5ch K-B5 25 Q-B5mate.

(f) Very strongly played. The threat is 26 P-K7, which cannot be met by 26 . . .Q-K2 because of 27 R-Q2 N-R5 28

(g) Moving the Knight, 27 . . . N-R5, allows 28 N-Q6, threatening 29 P-K7. Tal returns the piece.

(h) Exhausting defense takes its toll. After the game both players agreed that 28 . . . B-B1 offers some drawing chances.
