Resigns

(a) Modern theory regards 10 . . . B-K3 as best, freeing Black's QBP for a possible one-step advance into the center.

(b) Adequate, if carefully handled, but 11 . . . B-Q3! gives Black the initiative after 12 BxN QxB 13 QxQ PxQ 14 N-K2 P-QB4 15 P-QB4 PxP 16 BxP B-K4 (Alexander — Gligorich, Hastings, 1956-57).

(c) According to Euwe, 12 . . . P-KR3! guarantees a draw by perpetual check: 13 BxP PxB 14 Q-K3 PQ5 15 QxRP Q-Q3! (Paul Keres, Drispringerspiel bis Konigsgambit, Berlin, 1968, pg. 114).

(d) White takes excellent advantage of this inaccuracy. Better is an immediate 22 . . . R-K3 or 22 . . . R-K5.

(e) Of course not 23 . . . PxP? 24Q-Q4.

pressure

(f) Another fine move, returning the pawn for increased pressure.

(g) Despite bishops of opposite colors, White has a winning attack.

(h) Allows a brilliant finish, but passive defense does not avert defeat, e.g., 34 . . . B-K3 35 B-R5 (or 35 B-N4) and Black is in virtual zugzwang, 35 . . . K-B2 36 R-Q7! BxR 37 PxR R-Q1 38 QxQBPch K-B1 39 BxR QxB 40 Q-B5ch K-B2 41 QxP.
