COMPUTER CHESS

Jim Hurt, problems columnist for "Chess in Action," and his son, Shawn, had the good fortune to play chess with a newly programmed CDC computer in Sunnyvale on Father's Day.

A chess diagram is projected onto the computer's own TV screen and all moves are registered directly on the face of the tube, so that a chess set is not needed to play.

On its fast setting (8-48-1; 10 minutes per game) the computer selects eight possible moves, then for each of them analyzes up to 48 direct responses and settles on one of these as "correct." Finally, comparing all eight correct responses, it plays the best one as its move. White: Jim and Shawn Hurt. Black: CDC computer.

but computers aren't perfect. (d) The only move to avoid mate.
