USSR CHAMPIONSHIP WINDING UP
With only five rounds left to play, former world champion
Boris Spassky retains a half-point lead in the Soviet Championship, posting an interim tally of $8\frac{1}{2}$ - $3\frac{1}{2}$. In hot pursuit is Viktor Korchnoi at 8-4, closely followed by Anatoly Karpov and Lev Polugaevsky with identical scores of $7\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$.

"The 41st USSR Championship has already produced some fine games, but this one stands out for its very high, sus-

fine games, but this one stands out for its very high, sustained level of attack and defense. Multiple sacrifices alternate with counter-combinations, while considerable courage unfolds under severe time pressure. No wonder both combatants shared equally in the enthusiastic applause when the time control was safely met."

(a) Tukmakov's aggressive mood may be explained by his poor past showing versus Karpov. Here he seeks revenge by preparing to storm the approaches to the enemy king. Neither, however, does Karpov approach his will be seeks. however, does Karpov conceal his will to win, evidenced by his dangerous choice of opening variations, reminiscent of his game against Smejkal at the Leningrad interzonal. In both cases Karpov's defense survives every assault made on it.

(b) Covering possible attacks against the KRP

(c) White, too, meticulously provides for the coming offensive.

(d) Mobilization complete.

True to form. Karpov takes what he can before hanging (e) on. Black cannot be prevented from winning the exchange by either N-K6 or N-B7ch.

(f) Giving up an additional pawn's worth of material in order to clear a path for his rook to reach the KN file.

(g) Very risky would be 20...Q-B7 because of 21 B-Q4.

(h) All of White's forces are poised for the kill, while Black rushes up the reserves. Masking his achilles' heel-the long black diagonal-and

sidestepping an insidious snare at the same time: 24... R-K3? 25 B-B4 RxN 26 RxPch! KxR 27 BxQ

(j) Re-capturing with 27...QxB loses to 28 BxRch QxB (28...KxB 29 R-KB3) 29 QxBch and 30 QxR and White guards the mating square.

(k) With this move Tukmakov had used up virtually his entire allotment of time and had to make the remaining moves to time control at lightning speed.

(1) Sacrificing his queen, Black launches a powerful counter-29...R-B1 crumbles under the sxPch! e.g., 31...QxB 32 Q-B2ch attack. The natural looking weight of 30 RxRch KxR 31 BxPch! weight of 30 RxRch KxR 31 BxPch! e.g., 31 K-N1 33 BxR or 31...KxB 32 Q-N2ch K-N1 33 BxR

(m) Acknowledging the point behind Black's 29th move, as 31 QxB cannot be played due to the crushing response, 31...R-QB3!! which forces White to return the queen to avert mate

and leaves him with a lost position

(n) Frees his rook for action at the cost of a pawn.
(o) The sealed move.

(p) The legitimate outcome of perfectly balanced attack and defense.
