(a) The standard 7 KN-K2 essayed by Nimzoviten against Capablanca over 40 years ago (New York, 1927) continued 7...P-QB4, 8 PxP BxP, 9 0-0 N-K2, 10 N-R4 Q-B3, 11 NxB QxN 12 B-K3 Q-B2, 13 P-KB4 N-B4, and now instead of 14 P-B3
White could have obtained the better game with 14 B-B2
P-KR4, 15 QR-B1 and 16 P-B4. But Black equalizes after
7...Q-R3 (which Capablanca rejected because he was playing 7...Q-R3 (which Capablanca rejected because he was playing for a win) 8 N-B4 QxQ, 9 NxQ N-Q2, 10 B-K3 N-K2, 11 P-B4 N-KB4, 12 B-B2 P-KR4, 13 K-K2 P-QN3, 14 P-QN4 P-R4, 15 P-QR3 (Isaac Boleslavsky), Caro-Kann bis Sizilianisch, Berlin, 1968, pp. 26-27). White's innovation, 7 QN-K2, works well in the first line but falls a tempo short in the second.

(b) To prevent 9 . . .PxP, 10 PxP N-N5 and prepare P-QN4. The "hole" on White's QN3 is easier to identify than to exploit, e.g., 9 . . . P-QR4, 10 N-B3, P-R5, 11 0-0 N-R4, 12 N-Q2 R-B1, 13 Q-B2 Q-N4, 14 R-K1 PxP, 15 NxP Q-Q2.
(c) Having drifted into an inferior position, Black compounds his ills by neglecting to temporize until White castles first.

(d) And here the lesser of two evils, of course, is 15 . . . P-N3.

(g) Giving up without a fight (even 21. . Q-Q1, Q-KN3 QxP, 23 B-B1 takes longer), but allowing a sacrificial finale.
