Finishing in a tie for 1st-3rd places were **Arthur Bisguier** (2449), **Norman Weinstein** (2504) and **Edwardo Celorio** (2320), winning \$700 each for identical scores of 7-1 (with the trophy going to Bisguier).

SPASSKY VERSUS MADDIGAN: 0-1!

Having disposed of Robert Byrne in the quarter-final candidates' match in Puerto Rico, Boris Spassky stopped over in New York, where he conducted a simultaneous exhibition on 41 boards (including two masters and seven experts, all at \$25a board). at \$25 a board).

By evening's end, the USSR Champion had won 32 games and drawn eight, losing only one to 21-year-old Charles Maddigan, a former student at the University of California, Berkeley, now turned chess professional

(c) Great complications that favor Black follow 6 P-KR4 P-N5 (or 6...B-N2, transposing into the Philidor Gambit) 7 0-0

PxN8QxP.

(d) Rarely seen. The main line runs 7 P-B3 N-QB3 (Fischer likes 7...N-K2.) 8 Q-N3 Q-K2 9 P-KR4 N-B3 10 PxP PxP 11 NxP NxKP 12 NxN QxN 13 BxPch K-Q1 14 BxP NxP 15 B-N5ch K-Q2 16 Q-Q5 N-K7ch 17 K-B2 Q-KN5 18 N-Q2! P-B3 19 Q-K6ch QxQ 20 BxQch KxQ 21 KxN, with equality (Keres).
