### STAMER MEMORIAL RESULTS

The 12th annual Arthur B. Stamer Memorial chess tournament, limited for the first time to no more than 100 participants, was held at the prestigious Mechanic's Institute Chess Club in San Francisco, July 4-6, 1975. Mike Goodall directed the six-round Open USCF Swiss system event, which distributed \$1,800 in prizes to 15 winners in six playing categories. Complete results:

(a) Just an experiment, to see what Black will do.

(b) This has been played rarely, and not all, so far as I can determine, with the follow-up 12 . . . P-N4, other games having gone 12 Q-K4 N-N3 13 P-B4, with advantage to White. Although 11 . . . N-N3 is the usual move, 11 . . . P-N3, 11

N-N5 and 11 . . . 0-0-0 have also been tried.

(c) Presumably White chose to avoid the line, 12 Q-K4
P-N4 13 N-B3 P-Q4 14 BpxP BxB 15 KxB Pxp 16Q-R4ch Q-Q2, but this looks O.K. for him.

(d) Undoubtedly White's best try, seeking to exploit the gash in Black's King-side. If 13 P-KN3 instead, then 13 . . . N-N3 14 P-B4 PxP 15 PxP Q-R5ch is good for black, while 13 N-B3 14" allows 13. . . BxP!

(e) At this point Black makes a basic error in judgment. Instead of hurrying to exchange a pair of rooks, he should first seek to repair matters on his King-side with 26 . B-N2 and . P-KR3, after which the chances remain in the balance. 27 . As played, White gets a clearly superior endgame.

(f) Naturally not 42 PxP, which allows Black drawing chan-

ces after 42 . . . K-B3.

#### MORE GAMES FROM PAUL MASSON

A mixture of chess and wine at the Paul Masson Mountain Vineyard in Saratoga provided the setting for many interesting duels in the sun. Here a few more games from the record-breaking outdoor competition, recorded in USCF endorsed coodinate chess notation (files lettered "a" to "h", ranks numbered 1" to "8", always counting from White's lower left corner regardless of whose turn to move; pawn captures designated by file letters only).
