(a) While not a developing move, yet not wholly out of place either, as Petrosian has shown more than once. Theoretically best is 4 P-KN3, preparing to fight for control of White's K4 square by fianchettoing the KB.

(b) A push that robs Black's formation of its elastic "hypermodern" character by blocking the long diagonal.

(c) Gradually transforming a Queen's Indian Defense into an inferior variation of the Queen's Gambit Declined.

(d) Exploiting the weakened white squares on the queen side to the fullest.

(e) Virtually justifies White's fourth move, but Black's position is no longer easy to defend.

(f) Even less palatable would be 13...N-N2 14 B-QR6, e.g., 14...Q-N3 15 QR-N1 or 14...Q-B2 15 B-KB4.

(g) Desperately trying to cover the white squares...

(h) If 16...N-K4. abandoning his knight outpost, then 17 P-B4

QN-N5 (forced) 18 P-B5! B-Q2 19 B(2) xN, winning a piece.

(i) Hoping to remove his queen from the rook's line of fire after 18 BxB QxB, since White cannot gain a pawn with 19 BxN on account of 19...N-N3.

(j) Black must accept the sacrifice of White's bishop in order to save his own, only to lose a pawn at the end of the combination.

(k) Worrying about the defense of his QRP is the least of Black's troubles now.

(1) Perhaps White will play 27 PxB Q-B6. allowing the count-

er-threat ... R-Q7. (m) After 27...BxPch 28 RxB Q-R3 Black simply loses a

piece for a pawn.
(n) The brilliant point. On 28...QxB White has the surprising shot. 29 RxR!
