Class A prize, \$40, went to LEVIN; Class B, \$30, to KATZL; Class C, \$20, to FAGIN. A great event, and we understand there's a strong possibility of this becoming a "standard" annually at the Steiner Club.

Our U.S. team consists of FISCHER, EVANS, BENKO, R. BYRNE, D. BYRNE, and MEDNIS. U.S.S.R. team: BOTVINNIK, PETROSIAN, SPASSKY, KERES, GELLER, TAL. (Seems like the Russians stand a slight chance of winning in the finals.....)

Some results from U.S. matches: We whacked Mongolia 4 - 0, mangled SWITZERLAND 4 - 0, and knocked Bulgaria cold 2 - 2.

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For the record -- It would be a psychological victory for us to consider that the new rules governing the next Candidates Tourney were set on account of Bobby FISCHER's suggestions and complaints. But, we must be fair: the proposal came from the Soviet delegation, outlined in "Chess in the U.S.S.R." magazine, issue June 20th, a few days before the end of Curacao. As far as we know, this was before FISCHER's sounding-off; certainly before the Sports Illustrated article. He undoubtedly influenced the FIDE decision, however. Whichever way, the new rules are fine.
