Our heartiest congratulations, fellows - your ratings of course should zoom up to that magic 2000 mark. Incidentally, while HAYES won his preliminary section at Whittier, WOLLSCHLAGER only tied at the 4-1 mark with D. ARGALL in his section; put on a spurt in the finals. Other winners included Hector GUADARRAMA (Whittier) and Don COTTEN (San Bernardino) tied for third, at 7½ - 2½; and several "under" prize winners.

WE WEREN'T THERE.....

.....And time was too short to obtain the little background "goodies" we usually provide on a great tournament. So we just comment on the obvious.

Seven masters and thirteen experts led the field of 90 enthusiasts, and as it invariably occurs in such large tourneys where many unknown potentials are lurking, they did not all finish in the first 20. In fact, we notice names like Walt CUNNINGHAM and Bill MAILLARD 'way down toward the end of that number. Top finishers Tibor WEINBERGER (6½-½) and Irving RIVISE performed true to form; M. LEIDNER of the Valley, who tied for second (6-1) with RIVISE, put on a tremendous show in winning six straight after losing his first round game, but was assisted somewhat by the idiosyncrosy of the Swiss system which paired him with weaker opposition than anyone else had to buck in the first 20 finishers. (See tie-breaking points.)

California Junior winner Jim TARJAN is showing he's no flash in the pan; and Steve RAINS seems to be getting stronger each month. And, lest we forget, that grizzly upsetter, H. D. RADER, did it again! He disposed of veteran expert Sven ALMGREN in the first round, followed it up later by defeating two top Class A players.

The tournament was directed by Grandmaster Isaac KASHDAN, who, with the PIATIGORSKY CUP coming up, is in for a busy time!
