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MASTER THREESOME TOPS CALIFORNIA OPEN

The hushed excitement enveloped the entire Arcade Room of the Hacienda at Fresno during the seventh and last round, as Tibor WEINBERGER, entering the round with a perfect 6-0, fought to overcome a disadvantageous position against John BLACKSTONE. Tibor needed only a draw to secure clear first and the Cal Open title - - but there was a knave in the cards as BLACKSTONE played carefully, pressing a pawn plus to a hard-fought win. This raised him to a tie with WEINBERGER at the 6-1 mark (he lost earlier to Ira POHL), where the two were joined by ex-State Champion Gil RAMIREZ, whose only loss was to V. RADAIKIN in round 3. The three shared \$340 in 1-2-3 prizes, and gain qualification into the State Championship to be held at the end of the year in San Francisco. (To be confirmed.)

Upsets were abundant once again - this seems to be the year for them - and three other masters did not fare well. Honorable mention for toppling the toppers goes to Jim McILRATH (1860) and Mike GOODALL (1909). See crosstable for details - both players shared in the Class A prize, along with Allan VAN GELDER and Fresno's own Norman MILLER; while the Expert Prizes were carried off by Art SPILLER and Dave BLOHM, also Hugh NOLAND. SPILLER took first expert with 5½-1½, the others shared second with 5-2. Other class winners included, John ROWELL (1) Ray CUNEO and R. POST, Paul VAYSSIE and George OAKES (2) Class B; Greg WONG, Roy ERVIN and R. SILLS, Class C, and Frank HARRIS, Upset. Actually, SILLS, ERVIN, GOODALL and McILRATH all had higher total upset points than HARRIS, but as they have all qualified for other prizes, Frank gets the runner-up spot.

The 70 entrants were the lowest for many years and could be attributed to many factors. A conflicting tourney at Ventura, the upcoming almost conflicting Long Beach Classic, lack of publicity in the California Chess Reporter, State Federation organ to all CSCF members, late arrival of Chess Life containing publicity, the announcement of only one guaranteed prize instead of all class prizes etc. and so forth. Which is really to blame, or partly all - maybe you can tell us - if you weren't there, why weren't you? In spite of all, a grand, enjoyable event with no skirmishes except over the board.

FROM THE T.D.'s SCRAPBOOK

The Weekend Tournament Player

(Part I)

He arrives an hour before registrations close, greets friends and nemeses and settles down at once to some analysis or rapid transit.

An hour later, at the announcement that registrations are about to close, rushes to register (along with dozens of others) thereby delaying the start of the round by ½ hour. After registration, begins to grumble immediately as to why the round doesn't get under way.

Then he gets down to studying some Swedish magazine containing the latest innovations in the From Gambit. He is totally absorbed in this during the TD's opening announcements about rules, regulations, time-limits, etc. - all of which he naturally misses. He perks up when the pairings are announced and listens intently to everybody else v. everybody else; then rushes to the TD's desk to find out whom he is playing.

Now he disappears for a last-minute drink of water (after asking the TD where the fountain is, though he'd been leaning on it while studying his magazine) and to tell everyone on the way whom he's playing and what his past record is against this opponent. (Always a plus score.) Finds his table and sits down; gets up again and off to the TD to ask for a set, board, clock and pencil. He's off again, no one knows where, to be back a little later to ask if the TD knew where his opponent was. (His opponent has been sitting at the allotted table for ten minutes.) Finally, he begins to play!

During the next hour or two, he's engrossed in the game, breaking it spottily only to complain about the airconditioning, the lights, his opponent's cigarsmoke, the noise outside (a car dared to sound its horn), and the kibitzers around his table. After move 11, he reports to the TD how he has a won game already, explaining carefully how the opening moves went.

Periodically, he reports further progress of the game. Included are: the beautiful 6-move combination, the pawn-move cramping his opponent into a zugzwang, maybe the sacrifice. Then comes the tough position that can still be easily drawn; a little later, a long lamentation. Then silence, except for asking the time of the next round.
